Economic Development Programs

Main Street Area: The City continues to encourage business and property owners to take advantage of the Main Street Economic Development Programs. The Main Street Relocation Grant is available to apparel and shoes stores, bakeries, coffee shops, full service and fine dining restaurants, gourmet food shops, grocery stores, health clubs and yoga studios, ice cream shops, and entertainment businesses. Business owners can receive a grant of up to \$10,000. The Retail Storefront Façade Improvement grant will allow property owners with a grant of up to \$5,000 to make renovations to the exterior of their commercial properties.

Commercial Corridor Area: The Commercial Corridor Program was established to recruit new businesses to the City and assist in the expansion of existing businesses. The Program offers reduced permit fees and tax credit opportunities. The target areas for the Program are the following Revitalization Overlay Areas along US Route 1: RO-1- City Center, RO-2-Highway Corridor and RO-3-Route One Historic District and Gateway Approaches.

And congratulations to the Department of Economic and Community Development for their recent Main Street Maryland recognition from the State! Keep up the great work!

Fire Marshal/Permit Services

We are heading into the holiday season and that means a lot of things to keep an eye out for to stay safe:



Turkey Fryers

People will be using fryers to cook turkeys this Thanksgiving. Remember to read all instructions and safety guidelines **before** using the fryer, such as keep the fryer away from the house; DO NOT use inside the garage or house; and keep them off of wooden decks!

Christmas Tree Safety

To keep your tree looking beautiful and your home safe from fire, remember to cut off the bottom of the tree so it can absorb the water. Water your tree daily. Check all electrical lights before putting them on the tree, since a short in a light could make the tree go up in minutes! Check to make sure they are UL approved lights! And keep the tree away from heat sources, like vents, to prevent the tree from drying out.

Winter Safety Tips

If you have gas appliances like a stove, water heater, and/or fireplace you should have a CO detector on each level of the home.

Carbon monoxide, also known as CO, is called the "INVISIBLE KILLER" because it is colorless, odorless, tasteless and is a poisonous gas. CO is caused by the improper use or incorrectly vented fuel-burning appliances such as furnaces, stoves, hot water heaters, fireplaces and generators inside the garage or house.

Know the symptoms of CO poisoning:

- Headache
- Fatigue
- Shortness of breath
- Nausea
- Dizziness
- Everyone in the home getting sick at the same time (flu like symptoms)

High level of CO poisoning with severe symptoms:

- Mental confusion
- Loss of muscular coordination
- Loss of consciousness
- Ultimately, death

Space Heaters Need Space - from Energy.gov

"Safety is a top consideration when using space heaters. The U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission estimates that more than 25,000 residential fires every year are associated with the use of space heaters, resulting in more than 300 deaths. In addition, an estimated 6,000 people receive hospital emergency room care for burn injuries associated with contacting the hot surfaces of room heaters, mostly in non-fire situations.

When buying and installing a small space heater, follow these guidelines:

- Only purchase newer model heaters that have all of the current safety features. Make sure the heater carries the Underwriter's Laboratory (UL) label.
- Choose a thermostatically controlled heater, because they avoid the energy waste of overheating a room.
- Select a heater of the proper size for the room you wish to heat. Do not purchase oversized heaters. Most heaters come with a general sizing table.
- Locate the heater on a level surface away from foot traffic. Be especially careful to keep children and pets away from the heater."

When is a Snow Emergency in Effect?

The City's Snow Emergency Plan goes into effect whenever a Snow Emergency is declared for Prince George's County. Also, the Mayor may proclaim or end a Snow Emergency.

Snow Emergencies are announced on most local radio and television stations. Laurel TV, Channel 996(HD) or 71(SD) on Comcast and Channel 12 on Verizon, will broadcast snow-related announcements and closings, and it will be posted on our Social Media sites at Facebook and Twitter.

During a Snow Emergency, parking is prohibited on the even-numbered side of designated City Snow Routes. All other posted parking restrictions remain in effect. Parking is prohibited on both sides of the street along State and County Snow Emergency Routes. You may also receive a telephone message from the City advising you to remove vehicles if they are parked on a Snow Emergency Route. Remember ODD is OK! Based on the anticipated severity of the storm, temporary parking restrictions may be in effect in certain neighborhoods. Public Works will install signs prior to the snow event, so keep your eyes open and watch for those special postings!

Should you have any questions about the Snow Emergency Plan or if you cannot find your street and/or development on the Snow Emergency Map, please call the Department of Public Works at 301-725-0088 Monday through Friday from 8:00am to 4:00pm (TTY/Text users call via Maryland Relay). Public Works is staffed during all snow emergencies. For your convenience, you can also e-mail Public Works at dpw@laurel.md.us.

Clearing Sidewalks

City Ordinance requires all owners and occupants to clear ice and snow from sidewalks fronting their property within 12 hours after the cessation of snowfall or ice accumulation. Failure to clear your sidewalk may result in a fine. Please clear your sidewalk for the convenience and safety of pedestrians. Don't shovel ice and snow from your driveway or sidewalk onto the street. It causes a traffic hazard that must be plowed and salted again.

Prevent Theft! Secure Your Vehicles!



November and December bring the holiday season, which can reason as to why we see an increase in certain crimes. Package thefts from porches, or porch pirates, have been an issue nationwide and continue to be a problem. Keep track of when they should arrive and try to have someone there to sign and receive. Call LPD immediately if a package gets tampered with or stolen.

With the holiday season, the shopping centers will become very busy. Be careful driving around. Look for pedestrians and people pulling out of parking spaces. Try to park in well-lit areas and do not leave packages or recently purchased items in open view of the vehicle, enticing thieves.

Speaking of leaving items in your vehicle, we wish we did not have to say this, but **do not** leave your kids in your car when you are shopping. This is against the law. No child seven or younger is allowed to be left in a car alone. This is extremely dangerous and disturbing. If you see a child seven or younger in a car alone, please call us immediately to come to the scene. We go on too many of these calls every year.

With the cold weather approaching, please do not leave your car unattended when the vehicle is running. It is against the law for the vehicle to be running and unattended, with the keys in the ignition. Every year, we receive calls of stolen vehicles because the person thought they could run into the store really quick or wait in their house. This is a good way to upset your insurance company as well. Don't do it!

We want everyone to enjoy their holiday season. If you choose to drink, please do not drive. Call a cab, an Uber, or get a designated driver. Laurel Police will be participating with multiple agencies throughout the state in DUI Strikeforce. Officers will be out looking for impaired drivers.

We expect the Charity Phone Scams to pick up during the holiday season as well. A good tip is if the person is requesting you to send gift cards, there is a good chance it is a scam. Firefighter Associations and Police Unions do not ask for people to send them gift cards. Any time someone is asking you to send money via phone, always question and verify.
