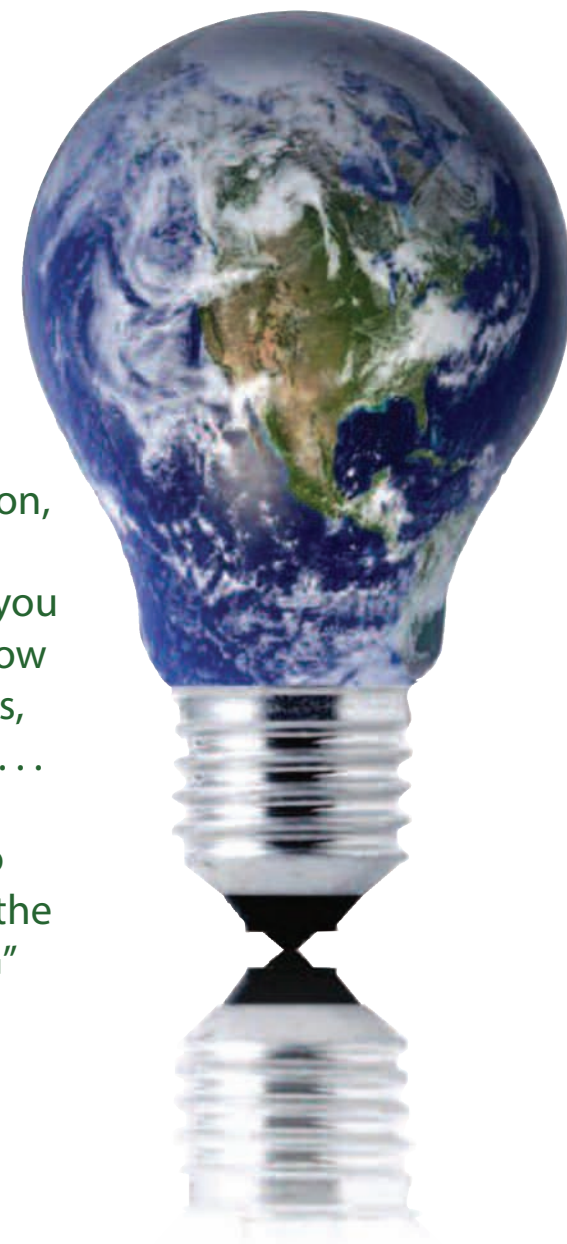
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Welcome to the NEW 2022 City of Laurel Services Calendar

We have a new look, new information, volunteer opportunities, AND have kept all the important information you are used to! Collection day maps, how to prepare your items for collections, special event days and much more . . .

As part of the City's commitment to creating a sustainable community, the focus this year is on "**GREEN LIVING**" and taking the guess work out of what green living is.



What does it mean to be green?

Recycling is one part of reducing our impact on the environment. Whether you are reducing your waste, your water usage or your buying habits, a little effort goes a long way.

REDUCE: The first step to being eco-friendly is to reduce – sounds easy right: Some ways to think about reducing:

- **Reduce energy** consumption by taking shorter showers.
- **Reduce waste** by not buying single-use plastics (plates, bowls, cups, water bottles).
- Bring **reusable bags** to the grocery store.
- **Ask yourself is this purchase essential?** Have you thought about a neighborhood share for large items like electric/ battery-powered lawn mowers?

RECYCLE: Sometimes producing waste is inevitable – recycling is the process of turning waste into new materials or objects.

- **Have you considered joining the curbside food waste collection?** The City's composting program takes your food waste and certain yard debris and creates ORGANIC compost!
- **Do you recycle right or are you "wish cycling"** – refer to Recycle Coach to get the latest on what and where you can safely recycle many household items.
- **Participate** in the City's bi-annual free electronics recycling/paper shredding/ EPS recycling events.

Here are some ways you can make a difference:




REUSE: Finding new uses for old items helps save resources and energy.

Some ideas:

- Purchase a **reusable water bottle** instead of using single-use plastic bottles.
- Cut the top off of an old soda bottle and hang it from a tree with bird seed for an **easy bird feeder**.
- Use **reusable bags** for gift giving.
- Pop your **used tea bags** in the fridge then place on your eyes for a natural eye de-puffer.

REPURPOSE: Perhaps the most creative of the four R's is to repurpose by taking a product you don't use or haven't used in a while and giving it a new life somewhere else. **Here are a few of our favorite ways to repurpose items commonly thrown away that could be used for another job:**

- **Repurpose with a purpose!** Organizations such as GreenDrop will collect gently used items from your home and repurpose them to support local charities.
- **Instead of throwing away an old t-shirt:** Cut it up into squares or rectangles and have new cleaning rags.
- Empty plastic milk cartons can become a **DIY watering can** by just poking holes in the cap.
- **Reinvent** your old CDs into coaster for your coffee table.



What's New in Laurel?

→ Monday Yard Debris is Moving to May

Yard debris is picked up on Wednesdays year-round, however in the Spring the City offers Monday pickups. These Monday pickups will be moving from April to May starting in 2022!

→ Mattresses and Box Springs Must Be Bagged

In October 2021, the City began requiring all mattresses and box springs set out for bulky item pick up to be placed in a sealed plastic mattress bag. Bags can be purchased from most big box stores.

→ Organics Composting

The City of Laurel has expanded the Organics Composting program for recycling organic materials like food scraps and can accommodate many more new members! Contact the Department of Public Works for information on how to join.

→ Plastic Bag Ban

Stock up on those canvas shopping bags! Starting January 1, 2022 business establishments in the City of Laurel will no longer be allowed to provide single-use disposable plastic bags.

→ EPS (Styrofoam) Recycling

EPS - recycle your EPS products! The City promotes the ban on food service containers, but certain EPS items will be around for a while. Recycle your EPS and turn it into something beneficial. Contact Public Works on how to recycle your EPS products.

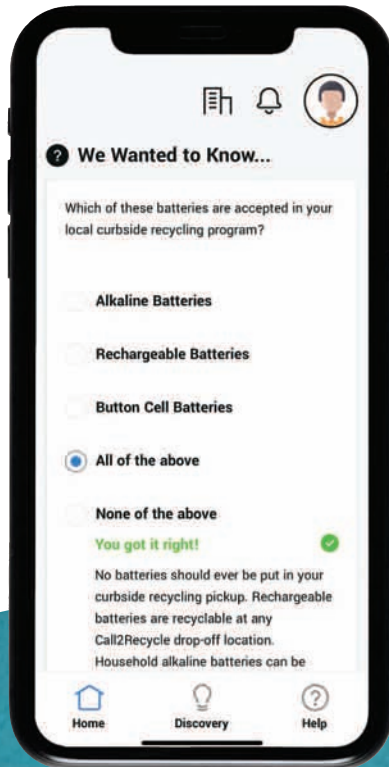

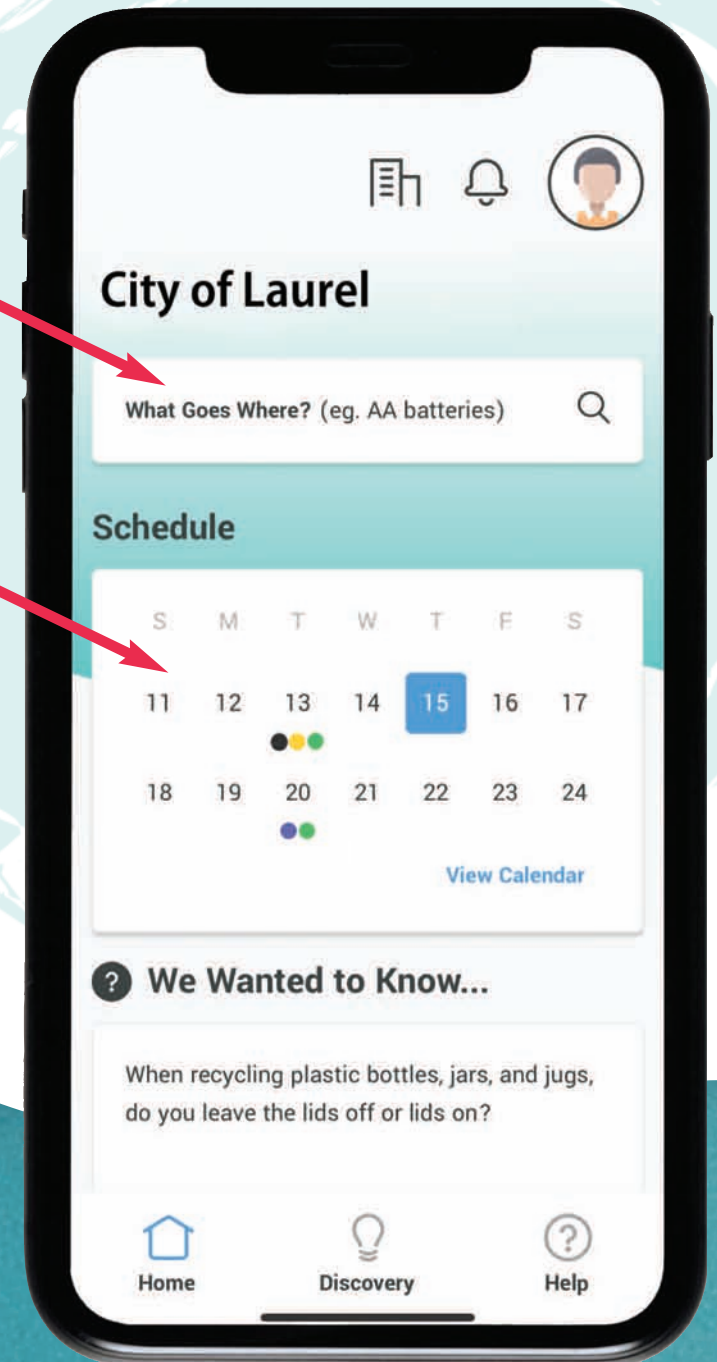

Your refuse, recycling and composting containers must be set out no later than 7 a.m. on your scheduled collection day and no earlier than 7:30 p.m. the night before.



Please make sure that all bin lids are fully closed.

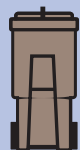

- Put items in LOOSE and not bagged
- Empty and rinse all containers
- NO plastic bags or Styrofoam
- NO beverage cups
- Remove plastic windows from pasta and tissue boxes
- NO used tissues or paper towels

Note: CFL and household batteries need to be bagged and placed NEXT to green toter.

Food Waste/Composting



- Use certified compostable bags ONLY or 100% recycled paper bags
- Meat (including bones) and shellfish (including shells) are acceptable
- NO animal feces
- NO used paper towels with chemical cleaners
- Animal hair and dryer lint is acceptable
- Approved compostable table wear
- Leftover and spoiled food

Refuse

ALL refuse MUST be containerized



Items not accepted with curbside refuse collection

- Furniture and appliances
- Construction and renovation debris
- All non-organic materials regardless of size!
- Yard debris (schedule a pickup)
- Recyclables
- Hazardous Waste

Bulky Items

Items not accepted with regular household refuse can be collected during residential special collection days.






Monday is the deadline to schedule a Wednesday collection. Call DPW at **301-725-0088** or e-mail: DPW@Laurel.md.us

- **Oversize:** Box springs, car seats, furniture, lamps, luggage, toilets, mattresses, carpeting, etc.
- **Metal:** Appliances, barbecues (no propane tanks), bed frames, bicycles, water heaters, etc.
- **Construction debris must be in a 95-gallon toter with a lift bar.**
- All gas tanks must be removed from garden tools and grills.

A base fee of \$10 is charged per pickup. An additional fee, typically from \$5 - \$25 per items is charged for certain bulk items and electronics.

FREE Christmas Tree-Cycling

You can place your Christmas tree at the curb by 7:00 a.m. every Wednesday throughout January for recycling.

Your tree will be tree-cycled into a variety of new products, like mulch, compost, or animal bedding.

Remember to:

- Remove all decorations, lights, wire, tree skirts, stands and nails.
- **DON'T use fake snow** on your tree; your tree can't be recycled.
- Use an old sheet to take your tree outside and avoid using a plastic tree bag.
- Remove the old sheet (or the plastic tree bag), DO NOT leave at the curbside.
- Bring your tree to the curbside by 7:00 a.m., only on the Wednesday morning.

Green Resolutions

An easy way to transition to a more sustainable lifestyle is by making one small change at a time. Try swapping out single-use items for reusable versions.

Dryer Sheets – Instead of dryer sheets, you can purchase wool dryer balls which eliminate static and reduce dry time by up to 25 minutes. You can even add a drop of essential oil if you still want the benefit of scented laundry.

Napkins/Paper Towels – Invest in a set of reusable cloth napkins and a set of dish towels. During the week as they are soiled, you can throw them in with any laundry you have.

Straws – If you can't break the straw habit, there are some quality reusable straws on the market that are dishwasher safe. Ones with silicone tops are a great choice, and some come with carrying cases to take on the go.

Snow Emergency Clearing Routes:

Please be advised that a copy of the Snow Emergency Clearing Routes map is available on page 18 and on the City's website www.cityoflaurel.org. The City's Snow Emergency Plan goes into effect whenever a Snow Emergency is declared for P.G. County or the Mayor. Snow Emergencies are announced on most local radio and TV stations, Laurel Cable Network (Channel 71 on Comcast, Channel 12 on FiOS) and on the City's website.

Clear your Snow Reminder:

Property owners are reminded about the sidewalk clearing by-law and your responsibility to ensure that sidewalks have been cleared within 24 hours after the completion of a winter event.

We thank you in advance for your cooperation and appreciate everyone's efforts in helping to keep the sidewalks clear and safe for pedestrians. **Please DO NOT throw snow back into the street.**

Reminder to Residents:

The public is encouraged to park in driveways and garages whenever possible during winter weather. During a Snow Emergency on-street parking on Snow Emergency Routes is restricted to the ODD side of the street. **Remember ODD is OK.** If your car is towed, call Laurel Police Department at 301-498-0092.

Public Works is staffed during all snow emergencies, should you have any questions about the Snow Emergency Plan; please call Public Works at **301-725-0088** (TTY/Text users call via Maryland Relay), you may also use the City's **MyLaurelMD** mobile app or e-mail Public Works at dpw@laurel.md.us.

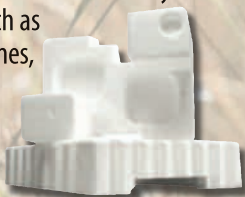
GreenDrop for Lightly Used Home Goods

The GreenDrop charity will have a vehicle on site to collect lightly used home goods. All items donated during this event will benefit one of three charities supported by GreenDrop – Purple Heart, American Red Cross and National Federation of the Blind. Drop-Off for EPS & Styrofoam

While we all would love to remove all polystyrene from the waste stream – sometimes that is impossible, but with recycling as an alternative – at least we can make something beneficial!

Bring your Styrofoam packaging to the event and EPS Industry Alliance will collect and recycle the products into things such as surfboards, picture frames, construction material, and new packaging.



Paper Shredding



Chesapeake Paper Systems will also be on site with their shredding truck to shred your documents safely. You can drop your documents off or stand by and watch them get put into the shredder truck! The shredding truck will accept old X-rays and other film, however it does not get shredded on site. Please make sure no non-paper items are mixed in with your documents, such as plastic floppy disks. Residents are limited to five boxes per trip. Residents and businesses are welcomed to make multiple return trips to drop off additional paper for shredding.

Acceptable Containers:

Place weeds, mulch, plant trimmings and leaves in paper yard bags or a rigid open-top reusable container. Bundle branches as shown below.

**No plastic bags
will be accepted!**



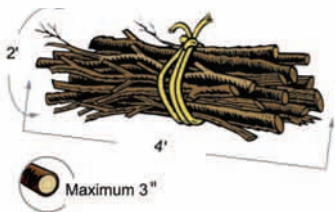
These items should not be placed with Yard Waste:

Kitchen scraps, rocks, dirt, sod, tree stumps, larger branches, flower pots/trays, painted or treated wood and animal droppings.

Recycle Your Pots & Trays!

Place empty containers with a 2, 5 or 6 inside the recycling symbol on the bottom in your Green bin or cart.

Remember to schedule your yard debris collection before the Monday deadline.

American homeowners spend hundreds of hours a year tending to their yards, but it can produce huge amounts of waste.

By following a few simple waste reduction practices, you can not only improve your garden, but also help the environment by reducing landfill waste and the gases they produce that are associated with climate change.

You can reduce the environmental impacts of landscaping by properly grasscycling, mulching, and composting!



Grasscycling

If you mow your lawn, leave grass clippings where they fall and allow them to decompose. This fosters healthier grass by returning nutrients to your yard.



Mulching

Make mulch from chipped or shredded wood or dried leaves. It prevents weed growth, helps to retain water, regulates soil temperature and adds nutrients.



Rain Barrels

Residents can use rain barrels to collect water for use in their gardens. This is a great way to conserve water and helps protect our rivers and streams from runoff pollution.



Xeriscaping

It is a technique that involves designing lawns and gardens to consider the natural landscape of a region. By using native plants and landscape designs you can optimize your garden for local conditions, reduce water use and soil erosion, lower maintenance costs, and preserve natural resources.



Composting

Recycling Matters

Recycling has both short-term and long-term benefits. Think of that plastic bottle, which can take thousands of years to break down when disposed of in a landfill. When you recycle, you are making a positive impact on the world in which you live today and for future generations in several ways.

Here's why recycling remains important:

- ♻️ **Protects Natural Resources** – Making products from recycled materials instead of virgin materials reduces the need to harvest, drill or mine for new raw material, which can affect local environments.
- ♻️ **Saves Energy** – It usually takes less energy to make recycled products than new ones. For example, recycling an aluminum can takes 95% less energy than creating a new one.
- ♻️ **Protects Clean Air and Water** – Making products from recycled materials generally creates less pollution than making new products.
- ♻️ **Reduces GHG Emissions** – In 2018 the EPA reported that about 94 million tons of MSW in the U.S. were recycled and composted, saving totals over 193 MMTCO₂E. This is comparable to the emissions that could be reduced from taking almost 42 million cars off the road in a year.*
- ♻️ **Saves Landfill Space** – Recycling diverts items from landfills or incinerators and extends the landfill life-span.
- ♻️ **Creates Jobs** – EPA released significant findings on the economic benefits of the recycling industry with an update to the job industry. The findings showed that in a single year, recycling and reuse activities in the United States accounted for: 681,000 jobs \$37.8 billion in wages; and \$5.5 billion in tax revenues. This equates to 1.17 jobs per 1,000 tons of material recycled.**

Climate change includes changes in temperature, shifts in rainfall patterns, and more frequent extreme weather events like heavy spring rains, drought, ice storms and heat waves. Greenhouse gases from the burning of fossil fuels in vehicles, heat, electricity production, and industry are all contributing to climate change. In 2019, U.S. greenhouse gas emissions totaled 6,558 million metric tons (14.5 trillion pounds) of carbon dioxide equivalents.*

Leave Those Leaves

Mulched or shredded leaves are an excellent source of nutrients and protection for your lawn and garden. Mulch helps retain moisture by reducing soil's exposure to sun and slowing evaporation. It chokes out weeds, too.

For best results, shred leaves when they are dry.

Push your mower slowly over areas where there are lots of leaves, you may have to run over them twice. Only a sharp mower blade is necessary, but a mulching blade, available from your local hardware or garden store, can make the job even easier.

Boost nutrients and moisture-retaining capability and choke out weeds by:

- Spreading leaves over your lawn to quickly decompose.
- Digging them directly into your garden.

In fall, spread leaf mulch on gardens and around shrubs and trees as winter protection.

Leave some space around shrubs and trees when mulching. Mulch is most effective when it is 2 to 3 inches (6-7 cm) deep.

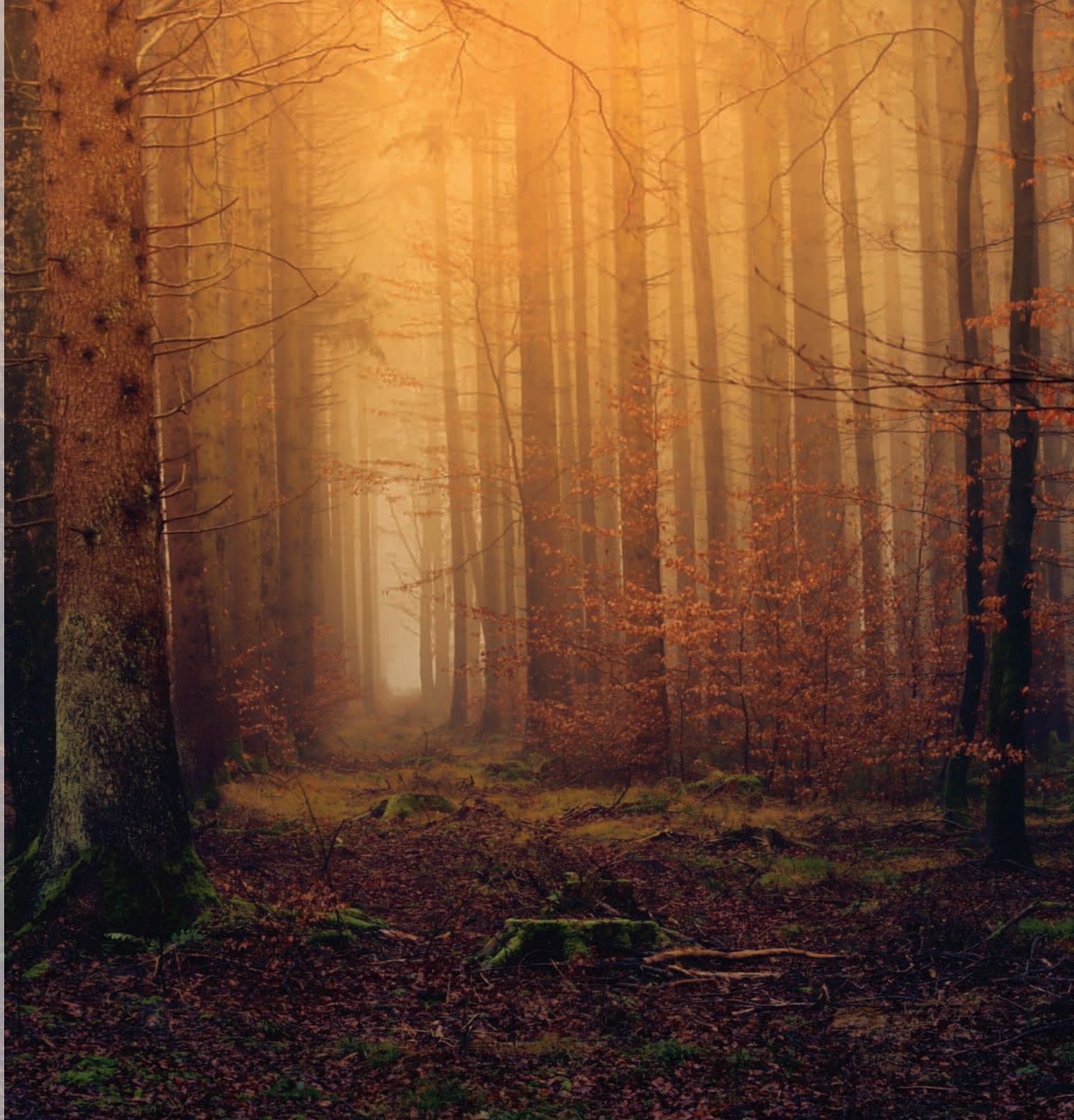

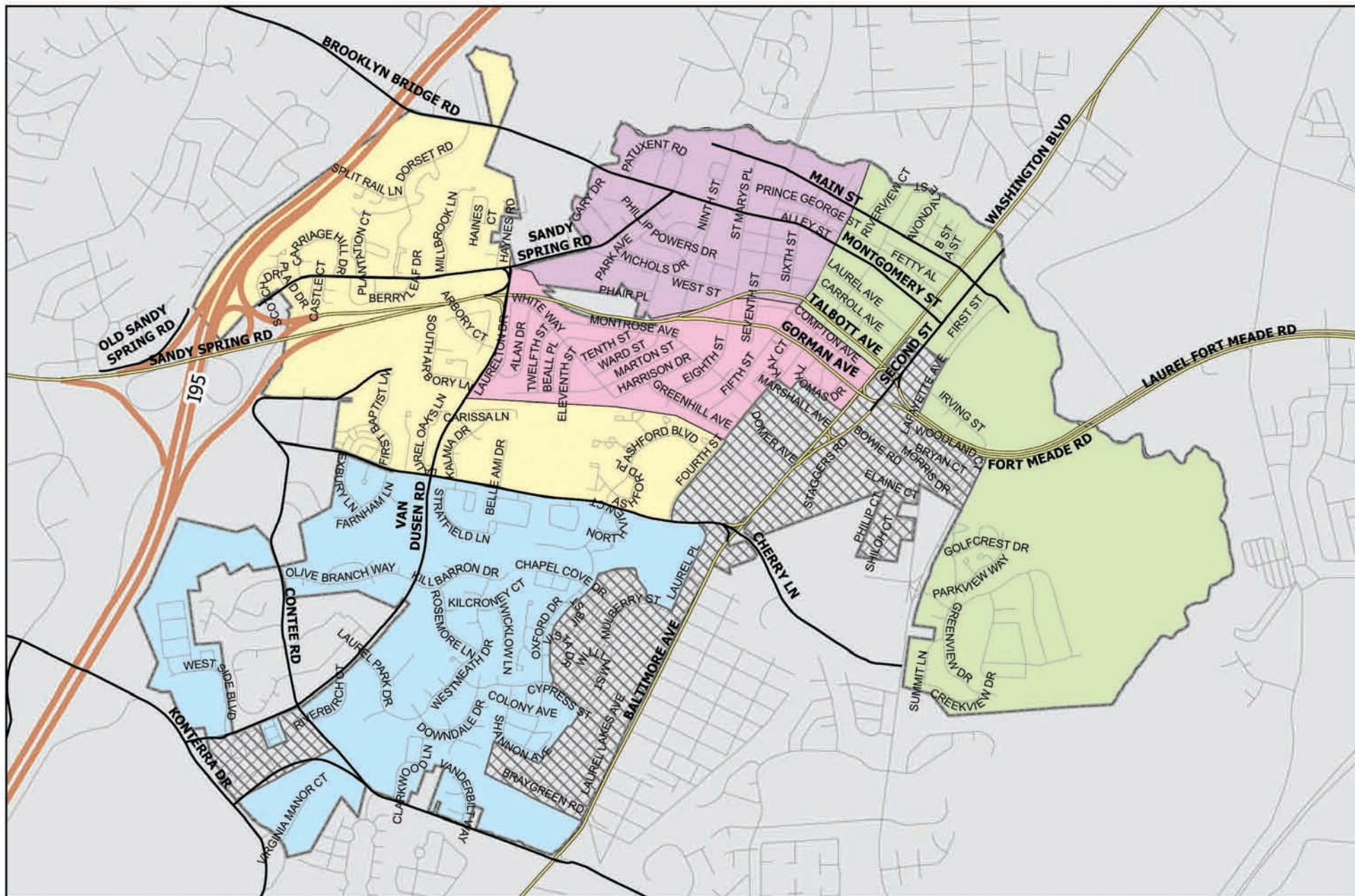

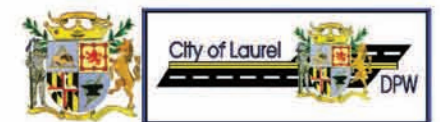
