

Bridging Resources and Hope: The Launch of the Craig A. Moe Multiservice Center

On September 10, 2024, the community gathered to celebrate the grand opening and ribbon-cutting ceremony for the new Craig A. Moe Laurel Multiservice Center. The Multiservice Center represents a significant milestone for the City of Laurel, aimed at enhancing resources and services for vulnerable populations.

Current Mayor Keith R. Sydnor delivered a heartfelt welcome, emphasizing the city's commitment to providing accessible services and fostering a supportive environment for all. Maryland State Senator Jim Rosapepe also spoke, highlighting the importance of the center in strengthening community ties and improving local quality of life. The ceremony included special proclamations from Prince George's County, Anne Arundel County, Howard County, and the City of Laurel, each recognizing the center's vital role in reinforcing community support systems. These acknowledgments highlighted the collaborative efforts across jurisdictions to bring this vision to life.

As attendees toured the facility, they observed firsthand the resources and services offered, including short-term housing units for men, women, and families, providing a safe and temporary living environment. The facility will also feature overnight sheltering for those in immediate need. For daily needs, a prepared meal service will be available, with a fully equipped kitchen and a delivery window, access to postal boxes and a package delivery area for their correspondence and deliveries. A barber and hair salon will be on-site for grooming needs, while a food pantry will provide storage and distribution of essential food supplies. Additionally, a learning center will offer educational resources and job training opportunities. For health services, a medical suite will be available, equipped with space for both physicians and nursing staff to provide necessary medical care. The new center is not just a building; it represents a commitment to investing in the future of Laurel and the greater community.

This facility is owned by the City of Laurel and managed by the Department of Parks & Recreation. It collaborates with various local agencies to ensure effective daily operations. The services offered at the Craig A. Moe Laurel Multiservice Center were chosen based on the recommendations of the City of Laurel Homelessness and Community Task Force, established in 2019. Their mission is to offer streamlined services that promote equity, create opportunities, and foster hope for a brighter future through the support of individual independence.

Laurel Thrive Small Business Grant Program

\$100,000 in Grants Available to Support New Businesses in the City

Mayor Keith R. Sydnor is proud to announce the launch of the "Laurel Thrive" Small Business Grant Program, a new initiative administered by the Laurel Department of Economic and Community Development (Laurel ECD). This program is designed to provide financial support to new businesses within the city, helping them to grow, expand and develop their operations.

The "Laurel Thrive" program aligns with the City's broader goals to spur economic development, foster entrepreneurship, and create additional jobs for Laurel residents. The program will offer grants of \$10,000 to eligible businesses that establish operations within the City of Laurel between July 1, 2024, and June 30, 2025.

"This grant program reflects our commitment to fostering a thriving business community in Laurel," said Mayor Keith Sydnor. "Small businesses are the backbone of our local economy, and we want to give them the support they need to succeed. By investing in new businesses, we're not just creating jobs, we're building a stronger, more resilient city for everyone."


Applications will be accepted beginning Tuesday, September 3, 2024, and will be reviewed on a first-come, first-served basis. Business owners are encouraged to carefully review all grant terms and application instructions before submitting their applications, as incomplete or inaccurate submissions may result in delays or ineligibility. Only one application per business entity will be accepted.

The total fund dedicated to this program is \$100,000, sourced from the City of Laurel's General Operation Budget. Business owners who have received funding from the City within the last five years are not eligible for this grant. Enhancing Engagement

Renovations in the Council Chambers for Enhanced Civic Engagement

The City of Laurel is making significant strides to improve public access and engagement with its government proceedings by investing in advanced audio and visual upgrades to the City Council Chambers. The renovation is designed to modernize the space's technology, enhancing both in-person and hybrid meeting capabilities.

This extensive upgrade project was initiated two years ago when the city secured the contract to overhaul the Council Chambers' aging audiovisual system. The renovations are being implemented to meet the growing demand for reliable virtual participation options. For instance, if a Councilmember, presenter, or resident can't make it to the Chambers for a meeting, they will still be able to participate.

Key features of the upgrade include state-of-the-art sound systems that provide clear and consistent audio throughout the room, coupled with new high-definition video equipment to capture and stream live sessions with professional-grade quality. These improvements will not only enhance the experience for council members and meeting attendees but will also significantly elevate the quality of live broadcasts and virtual meetings.

The renovations will also enhance our capability to conduct hybrid meetings, allowing participation both in-person and virtually at the same time. This is an essential competency for maintaining accessibility in local government, particularly considering the increased reliance on digital platforms by residents to get information about our community. With these renovations, the City of Laurel is preparing to meet the needs of a more digitally connected community, ensuring that residents can remain informed and involved, thereby fostering greater civic engagement.




A Vision for Growth: City of Laurel Unveils Historic First-Ever Strategic Plan for a Thriving Future
