## Newly Elected Councilmembers Sworn In City Council Welcomes New At-Large Member After Recount



On November 24th, during the Mayor and City Council Meeting, the newly elected City Council took the oath of office, officially beginning a new legislative term for the City of Laurel.

In the At-Large race, former Council President Brencis Smith secured his return to the Council after defeating incumbent Christine Johnson by a narrow margin of 641 to 621. The 20-vote difference triggered a charter-mandated recount, which later confirmed Smith's victory. Voters re-elected all other incumbents in Wards 1 and 2. In Ward 1, Adrian G. Simmons, who first joined the Council in 2024 through a special election, retained his seat with 547 votes. Councilmember James Kole earned 475 votes to begin his third term. In Ward 2, both Mills and Council President Kyla Clark ran unopposed, receiving 452 and 493 votes respectively. Seventeen write-in votes were also cast in this race.

Following the swearing-in, the newly seated Council voted to elect Brencis Smith as Council President and Adrian G. Simmons as Council President Pro Tempore.

The City extends heartfelt appreciation to the Laurel Board of Elections, our dedicated election judges, and every resident who took part in this year's municipal election. Your commitment to civic participation strengthens our community and ensures every voice is heard.

### Laurel's Youth Drone Pilots Gear Up for December Certification Exams

Up, up, and away! This fall, the City of Laurel's inaugural Youth Drone Certificate Program—launched by Mayor Keith R. Sydnor in partnership with Alpha Drones USA—has entered its final stretch. After 10 weeks of intensive flight training, safety and regulation instruction, and hands-on drone practice, the program's three student participants are now preparing to sit for their Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) Level 1 Drone Certification exams in early December. Mayor Sydnor selected three students aged 16–18 to participate in the program: Nelson Paulo, Robyn Wood, and Yusra Ali.



**Nelson Paulo** is a junior at Chesapeake Math & IT (CMIT) Academy North High School. He is interested in learning more about aviation, drones, and technology to prepare for future career opportunities in sports journalism. Paulo attended the Washington Association of Black Journalists' (WABJ) Urban Journalism Workshop at American University, learning skills in reporting and communications. "I'm really looking forward to learning how to use bigger drones and how to capture images from different angles," said Paulo. "I'm excited to apply these skills in the sports journalism field." Earning a drone certification license will help him expand these skills. Paulo volunteers at First Baptist Church, helping with refereeing and coaching Upwards Games. He attends youth groups and is serving as manager on the CMIT soccer team and a sprinter on CMIT's track team.

**Robyn Wood** is a junior at Eleanor Roosevelt High School. Wood was accepted into the science and technology program at her high school. She is interested in the hands-on experience where students can gain experience working with drones. "I'm excited to learn about the different functions of drones and how they can help make the world a safer place," said Wood. "I'm interested in becoming a drone pilot or using these skills in a career that involves math or engineering." She enjoys playing basketball in her free time.

**Yusra Ali** is a senior at CMIT. She has a passion for photography, technology, and learning. Ali wants to gain a more comprehensive understanding of drone operation and safety regulation. She already owns a drone and wants to learn how to use it professionally and apply the skills she learns to real-world scenarios. "I want to learn how to use a drone and apply those skills in future careers, especially in real estate photography and surveying," said Ali. She enjoys spending her free time reading and volunteering at local schools and her mosque.

"I'm so excited about this program," said Mayor Sydnor. "I wanted to give our youth an opportunity to gain entry-level skills so that as they advance in their careers, they're already qualified. The goal is for the City of Laurel to be successful with this program and to encourage other municipalities in Maryland to adopt it, helping strengthen the future job market, create more technology jobs, and make our state better overall."

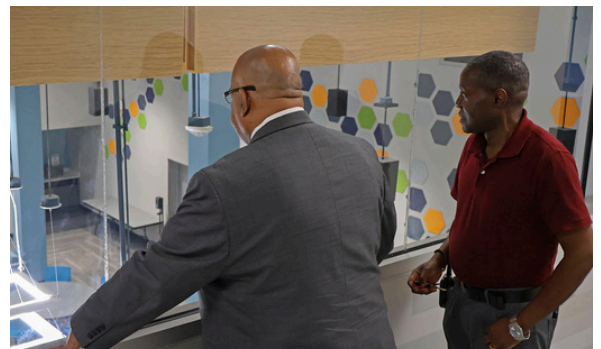
## A Conversation with Donald Whitehead, Jr., Laurel's Homelessness Task Force Chair

As temperatures begin to fall, the need for safe, warm shelter rises across Maryland. Each winter, more individuals and families seek refuge from the cold—and this year is no exception.

At the Laurel Multiservice Center (LMSC), the impact of winter is already being felt. During its first winter in operation, the number of unhoused individuals seeking services at the center doubled. In response to the growing need, LMSC's winter shelters are set to open by mid-December.

To raise awareness and foster community dialogue, the Multiservice Center recently hosted their inaugural Homelessness Awareness Panel. The event featured powerful stories from individuals who have experienced homelessness firsthand, offering insight into the challenges they faced and the resilience they've shown.

Among the speakers was Donald Whitehead, Jr., chair of the City's Homelessness Task Force and executive director of the National Coalition for the Homeless. Drawing from his own lived experience with homelessness, Whitehead emphasized the urgent need for expanded shelter services during the colder months and throughout the year.

## Revving Up For Safety New Camera Initiative Targets High Risk Areas with Steeper Fines

State officials are cracking down on drivers with a need for speed. On October 1, 2025, Maryland introduced two new speed enforcement laws to combat dangerous driving and reduce traffic fatalities. The laws are a cornerstone of the Vision Zero initiative, aimed at eliminating serious injuries and deaths on Maryland roads.

### WHAT'S CHANGING?

#### *Graduated Speed Camera Fines*

Drivers caught by automated cameras going 16 mph or more over the speed limit will face increased fines as high as \$425, replacing the previous flat rate of \$40. The new tiered system is designed to penalize excessive speeders more severely.

#### *Cameras on High-Crash Roads*

The City of Laurel can now install speed cameras on roads with the highest crash rates, not just in school or residential zones. Revenue beyond operational costs must be reinvested in road safety improvements on those same roads.

Maryland is stepping up enforcement to make roads safer for all. According to statewide data:

- 94 speeding-related deaths occurred annually between 2019 and 2023.
- More than 3,600 injuries per year were tied to speeding.
- Fatal crashes decreased by 6.3% in 2024, signaling that enforcement efforts may be working.

## Connecting The Community

### 8th St. Improvements Enhance Safety and Accessibility



The City of Laurel is undertaking the essential Eight Street Improvement Project to enhance infrastructure, safety, and accessibility for residents and commuters. This project involves comprehensive repairs and upgrades to improve the longevity and quality of the roadway and pedestrian facilities.

Key benefits include improved safety with new pedestrian ramps, raised crosswalks, and new rapid rectangular flashing beacon pedestrian crossing signals to enhance safety of walkers and cyclists; repair and replacement of damaged concrete and asphalt to extend the lifespan of the street; and enhanced accessibility by upgrading sidewalks and ramps to improve the compliance with ADA standards. The repairs started on October 13th, and the completion date is projected to be Monday, December 1, 2025.

“Pedestrian safety was our top priority when designing the improvements for 8th Street,” said Timothy Miller, Director of Public Works. “These enhancements include Rectangular Rapid Flashing Beacons and signage at Park Avenue, as well as at the entrances and exits of Emancipation Park, both featuring raised crosswalks to ensure safer crossings for everyone.”

Construction starts at Montgomery Street and runs until Eighth Street dead-ends but will avoid the area around Talbot Avenue. Those driving through the construction can expect temporary lane closures and traffic delays. Flaggers will be present to safely guide drivers through the work zone.

Pedestrian access will be maintained around construction zones, though temporary sidewalk detours may be necessary. Residents and commuters that utilize street parking will need to adhere to temporary ‘no parking’ signs. These will be posted at least 72 hours in advance in areas where work is underway. Vehicles parked in these zones will be subject to citation and towed at the owner’s expense. Intermittent, temporary closures of individual driveways will be required during curb, gutter, and sidewalk replacement.

Trash, recycling, compost collection, and emergency access will be maintained during construction.

## *A Night of Harmony*

### **All-County Honor Concert Showcases Student Talent and Heart Led By Laurel High School Choir Director, Kevin Lewis.**



In a powerful celebration of musical excellence and student achievement, talented singers from elementary, middle, and high schools across Prince George's County came together on Tuesday, November 18, for the highly anticipated All-County Honor Concert.

The evening was filled with moving performances, but one of the most memorable moments came when Laurel High School's choir director, Kevin Lewis, took the podium to conduct a chorus of students from 11 different schools—including 27 students from Laurel High. His leadership and passion left a lasting impression on both the audience and his students.

"Not only does he encourage and sort of nurture talent—and it comes out in the concerts—he is like a father to the kids," said Melissa Holland, a member of the Laurel Arts Council. "The affection they have for him... it shines through in every concert."

For Rebekah Castleman, a student at Northwestern High School and featured soloist, the experience was about more than just music.

"It's just so beautiful singing with people who are just as passionate as you," she said. "I've never had such a fun, serious, and caring director who truly takes his craft seriously and loves his students. Singing with all my peers—it was such a wonderful experience."

For Lewis, the concert was a full-circle moment. Returning to his alma mater, he reflected on how the school helped shape his love of music—and how he now shares that love with the next generation.

"I can't make beautiful music unless I have hardworking, talented musicians," Lewis said. "I'm grateful for all the schools whose teachers saw them fit to loan them to me for a little bit. These students were truly special, and they worked hard so that we could make this moment happen."

His students agree. Kevin Rodriguez, a Laurel High School student, summed it up simply: "What a wonderful man. Influential. Made me love music to the max. Makes me want to take it to the next level."

Holland echoed that sentiment, noting the deeper impact of the evening: "We're in a time of... sort of crisis in the nation, and these kids gave us hope. Their voices were filled with hope. And that, to me, was thrilling. That's what got the standing ovation."

## *Celebrating Chandler Robbins* A New Mural Honors a Bird Science Pioneer

Local group Laurel for the Patuxent recently unveiled a stunning new mural dedicated to the renowned ornithologist Chandler Robbins. The mural, measuring 45 by 15 feet, is a collaborative effort involving business owner Nadol Hishmeh, Friends of Patuxent, and Laurel for the Patuxent.

Located on the once-blank wall of the Quick Stop at the corner of Fifth and Main Street, this vibrant artwork is a tribute to Robbins' significant contributions to bird conservation both in the United States and globally.

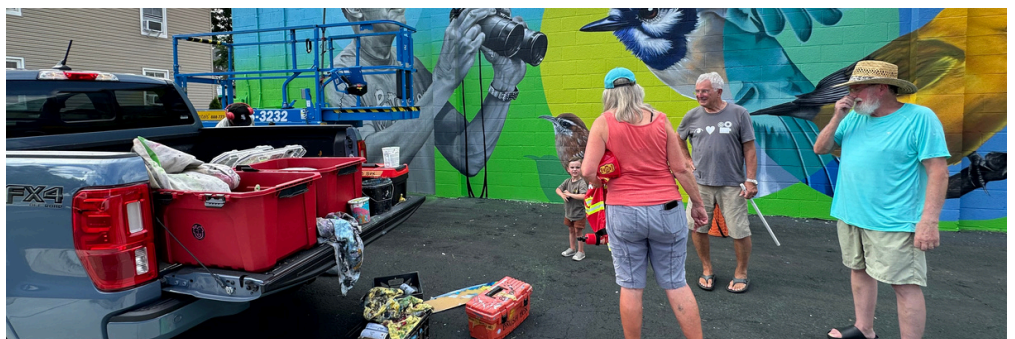
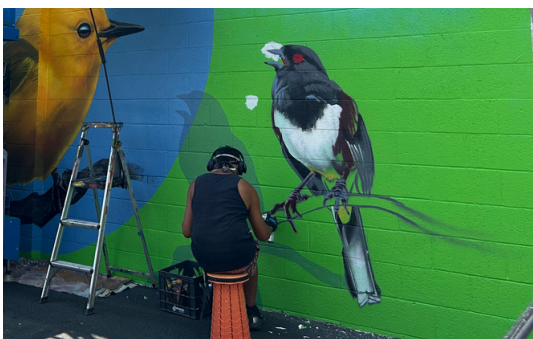
Chandler Robbins, born in 1918 in Massachusetts, was a pivotal figure in the field of ornithology. After graduating from Harvard, he joined what is now the Patuxent Wildlife Research Center. He played a crucial role in discovering the harmful effects of pesticide DDT on bird populations, a finding that had far-reaching implications for environmental conservation.

Robbins' career spanned over 70 years, during which he made numerous groundbreaking contributions to ornithology. He founded the North American Breeding Bird Survey in 1966, providing critical data on bird population declines and inspiring international conservation efforts. Robbins also co-authored the influential "Birds of North America: A Guide to Field Identification," which has sold over five million copies and introduced countless individuals to birdwatching.

The idea for the mural came from Laurel for the Patuxent member Ruth Walls, inspired after passing Robbins' house in Laurel. She suggested creating something to honor Robbins. After eight years of planning, fundraising, and finding the right artist and location, the mural finally came to life.

Local artist Jeff Huntington was chosen to bring this vision to reality. Huntington drew inspiration from Robbins' well-worn binoculars, which Robbins famously refused to replace, saying, "there are too many birds in these ones." This story inspired Huntington to incorporate overlapping circles in the mural, symbolizing a Venn diagram, to represent the interconnectedness of Robbins' work and the natural world.

Cheryl Dyer, a member of Laurel for the Patuxent, expressed her excitement about the mural, stating, "It's exhilarating. It's amazing. It's magnificent. There really aren't words to describe what this mural means to us, and particularly to Laurel for the Patuxent."

A well-stocked emergency kit is a thoughtful, valuable gift that can help someone stay safe and comfortable until help arrives. Basic emergency kits should include enough food, water, and other supplies to last for at least 3 days or 72 hours. Refer to the following twelve (12) basics of preparedness as a starting point to build your kit.



Once the basics have been covered, focus on gifting preparedness items that support your loved ones' unique needs and abilities. Younger children, persons with disabilities, teenagers, adults, and the elderly all have different, specific needs. Before buying a survival or preparedness tool, ask it is really practical, it is needed, and is it reliable? Do some online research before purchasing items to verify their quality, functionality, and reliability.

Finally, increase the value of the gift by taking time to show your loved one how to use it and how it fits into their emergency kit/plan. Spend time allowing them to practice using it. 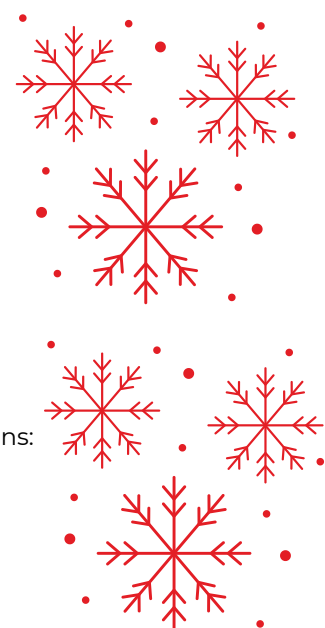

# Prime Time for Scams: Holiday Shopping Online Safety

According to the Federal Bureau of Investigations, nearly 12,000 people fall victim to holiday shopping scams each year. These scams result in over \$73 million in total losses. By using malware or fraudulent websites, criminals attempt to steal money and identities by creating fake charities and deals that are “to good to be true.” This holiday season become a “cybersmart” holiday shopper with these cybersecurity strategies from the City of Laurel Department of Emergency Management.

Protect Your Devices and Accounts Against Scammers

Software updates, strong passwords, and multifactor authentication (MFA) protect you and your devices from known threats and scammers. Keeping software up to date is easier when you enable automatic software updates. Strong passwords are typically 16 characters long and unique for each account, especially financial and email accounts. A password manager can generate, save, and fill in strong passwords for you. Multifactor authentication (MFA) bolsters your cybersecurity by requiring a second way to prove your identity. This is safer than using a password alone.

Recognize Phishing Attempts

Phishing messages are sent more frequently during the holiday shopping season. They are designed to look like they are from trusted retailers but contain malicious links.If you are unsure whether or not a message is legitimate, use a search engine to look up the company website and contact information. Be cautious of requests for information; real businesses will not ask you for sensitive information via text or email. If you suspect an email might be a phishing scam, report it and then delete the email.

Purchase With Confidence

Before providing personal or financial information to make an online purchase, it is best to verify a business' authenticity. The Better Business Bureau allows you to search if a business is accredited, research reviews, and view complaints. If you decide to proceed with your purchase, ensure your information is encrypted as it is transmitted to the merchant's server. Verify that the website address begins with “https” instead of just “http” and that the padlock icon is locked. It is also recommended to use a credit card rather than a debit card, as laws limit your liability for fraudulent credit card charges. Finally, monitor your accounts frequently and report any unauthorized charges to your financial institution.
